IEP 2020 Initial Context (the critical point we moved off)

- Evaluation in 2020 took place during a challenging transition (~70 % staff left)
- Self-evaluation (by former leadership) lacked key information, strategic focus and vision
- MIAS isolated within CTU
 - No joint programmes or research
 - Missing from key CTU strategic documents
- IEP 2020 recommendations led to clearer direction and development across all levels of activities



General Recommendations(CTU+MIAS)

√ Strengthening Synergy between MIAS and CTU

- In cooperation with five CTU faculties, MIAS developed seven teacher training master study programmes (mathematics, physics, chemistry, electrical engineering & cybernetics, informatics, civil engineering subjects, mechanical engineering subjects) under the National Recovery Plan (started in 2022, accredited in Jan. 2025)
- Joint research projects with faculties partly successful or still under review
- 2021–2023: CTU Future Fund internal support for restarting research (open access, conferences, project proposals, staff incentives)
- Since 2022: Postdoc funding to enhance research capacity



Recommendation: Strengthen research culture and increase academic research output.

- ✓Implemented incentive system for academic staff (projects, publications)
- ✓ Included research activity in academic staff evaluation

Result:

In 2023, **56** % **of staff** were research-active (lower share partly due to language teaching assistants)

Stronger focus on **research quality** needed



Recommendation: Internationalization

- ✓ Research
 - Postdoc positions
 - ERASMUS+ cooperation and research networking
 - Since 2023: one-month research fellowships for academic staff
- ✓ Teaching
 - Increased student and staff mobility (mainly through ERASMUS)
 - Cooperation with Virginia Tech, USA one-semester program in Economics and Management
 - English-taught study programs successfully restarted

Result: Restart achieved, with promising progress

Recommendation: Strengthen Cooperation with Non-Academic Sector

- ✓ Contract research: from $0(2020) \rightarrow 4$ projects $(2023) \rightarrow 7(2025)$
- **✓** Public and private sector cooperation:
 - **Lifelong learning** courses for teachers (Ministry of Education), courses with ECTS micro-certificates for corporate and public sphere
 - Czech language exams for permanent residence certified by Ministry of Interior
 - International aid joint education and research activities with Moldovan and Ukrainian universities (Ministry of Foreign Affairs)
 - Anti-corruption activities keynotes, consulting, and working groups (Ministry of Justice)



Recommendation: Raise MIAS Visibility and Public Awareness

- ✓ MIAS experts in media (especially public-service media) focus on public policy topics such as education, anti-corruption, and finance
- ✓ Public debates with prominent speakers, focused on current issues and open to a broad audience organized by MIAS
- ✓ Communication and Cooperation with Schools lectures and discussions for teachers and students, MIAS academicians invited as guest speakers and experts



- √ Teaching process collaboration (teaching linked to practice)
 - Guest lectures by experts from industry and government
 - Internships (since 2022): contracts with 30+ firms/institutions (≈50 in 2025)
 - Student projects with companies often internationally oriented (e.g. International Project Workshop, ATHENS)

Result:

Dynamic development but ! collaboration remains concentrated within a narrow group.



What Has Changed

Progress since 2020

- MIAS reintegrated into CTU
- ✓ 7 Teacher Training study programmes (impact on future high school teachers and students + links to research)
- **✓** Joint projects launched in 2023, others under submission \rightarrow need continued support
- ✓ Stronger collaboration with non-academic sector (incl. contract research, lifelong learning, external experts in MIAS study programmes)
- ✓ Internationalization progressing research projects, study programmes in English, postdocs, networking (ERASMUS+ projects
- ! More attention should be paid to research in economic fields and to supporting research-oriented academic staff.

Pedagogy and Teaching Methodology of Technical Subjects

- Seven Teacher Training study programs
- Five postdocs in pedagogy, teaching methodology, and psychology
- International research activities and networking

 Low level of team integration across CTU faculties

- Less developed teaching methodology of technical subjects in the Czech Republic
- Lower citation rate of published articles

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- Research in ingeneering pedagogy
- Improving teachers' competencies and teaching quality
- Improving the quality of future students and strengthening the interest in technical study programmes

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- Resources financial, human, and spatial (infrastructure) capacities for study programmes
- Decrease of interest in teaching profession
- Team stability accross CTU

Innovation Project Management

- Collaboration with the private sector: student internships, contract research, experts involved in teaching IPW project, ATHENS
- Collaboration within EUROTEQ network
- Private sector representatives on the MIAS Scientific Board
- Study programmes in English

- Lower level of internationalization
- Lower level of interdisciplinary collaboration within CTU
- Low number of publications in toptier (Q1/Q2) journals
- Lack of basic research

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- Improve alumni engagement
- Postdocs in economics
- HR policy focused on the quality of new academics
- Internationalization and networking leading to follow-up project initiatives
